

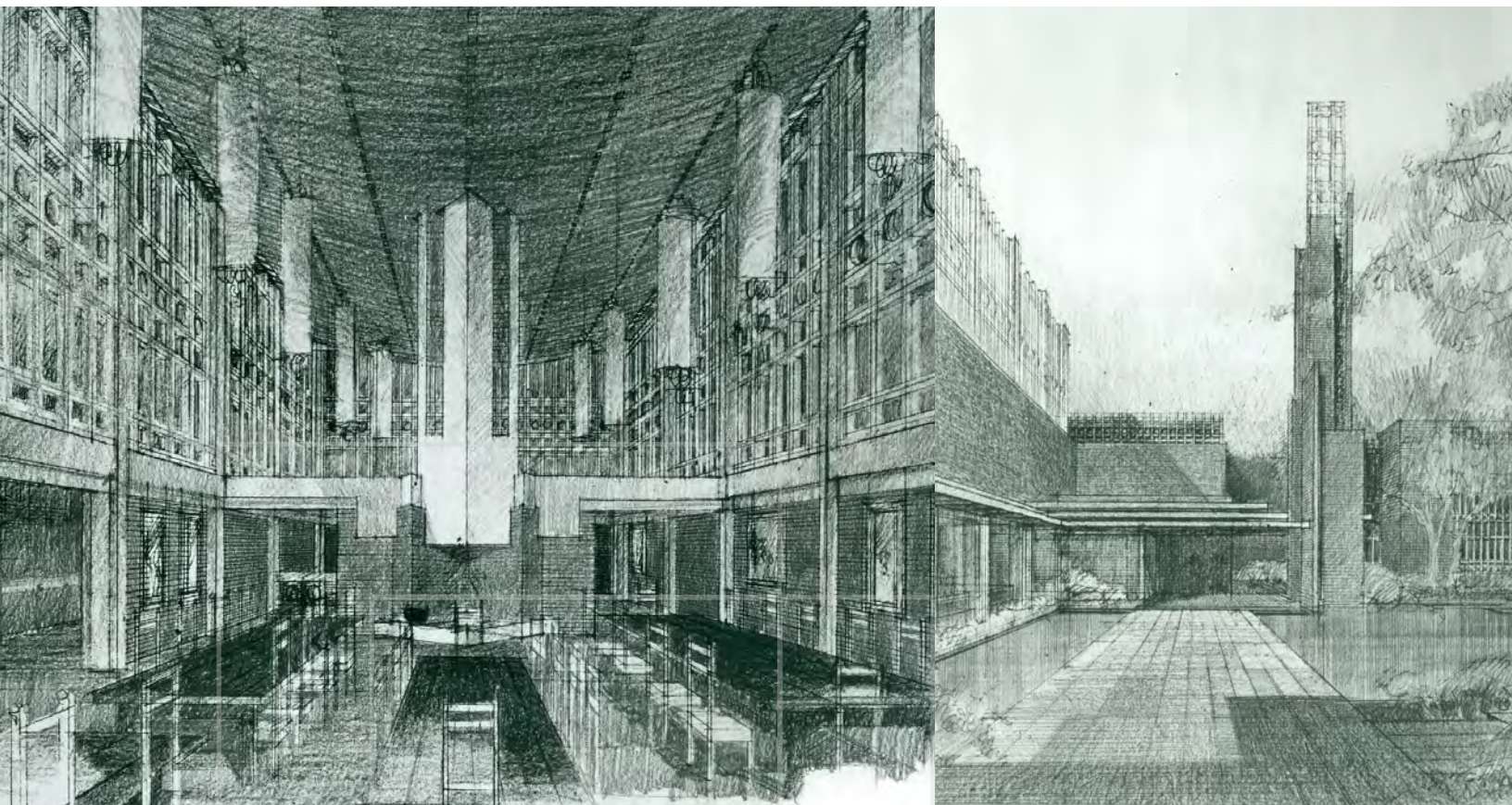

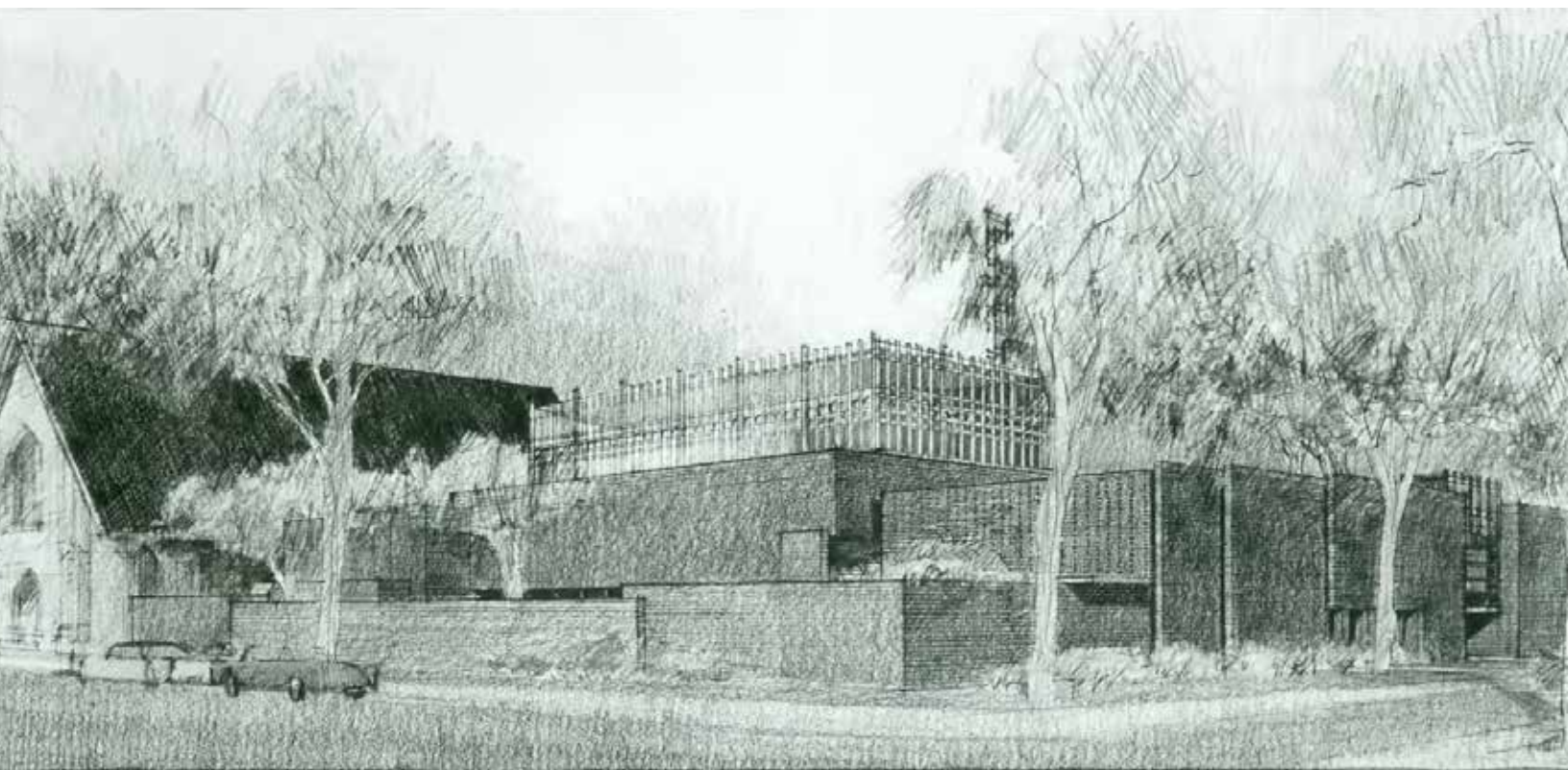
We leverage the intellectual capital of our intergenerational community of academic, business and community leaders to understand our evolving world and look for solutions to complex issues.

About Massey College

A registered Canadian charitable organization, Massey College was established in 1963 through an initial financial endowment of The Massey Foundation to “bring into being a College to serve a body of graduates limited in number but of high promise in scholarship and qualified to make worth the fellowship to which they belong. It is the Founders’ prayer that through the fullness of its corporate life and efforts of its members, the College will nourish learning and serve the public good.”

To foster this work, Massey College immerses talented graduate and professional school students from the University of Toronto (our Junior Fellows) in a community of distinguished academics (“Senior Fellows”), business and community leaders (“Quadrangle Society Members”) encouraging interdisciplinary and intergenerational exchange and learning.

The College includes a residence for both Junior Fellows and Senior Residents, providing opportunities for formal and informal mentorship, and presented more than 120 public events and programs this past year.





Message from the Principal

When I accepted the position of Principal of Massey College, I never thought that the pandemic would challenge us all to be creative and reinvent Massey as a virtual place.

Adaptation to COVID has been the hallmark of the last years. Nevertheless, we have continued to celebrate discovery, scholarship and community. We moved online our community building events, the High Tables, the meetings of the Book Club, the Music Salon, the Junior Fellows and Senior Fellow lectures. We also created new series to bring the community together in a spirit of curiosity: the Massey Dialogues, launched early in the pandemic, brought together Junior Fellows, Quadrangle Society Members and Senior Fellows in discussions on particular topics, from pandemic management to anti-Black racism, from digital transformation to politics to its impact on art and journalism. Our Ethics Series provided much space for discussion and reflection.

An in-depth Indigenous issues program in 2020 and 2021 brought us together and in the fall of 2021 we held the first annual ceremony to commemorate the National Day of Truth and Reconciliation at Massey College. Now that Public Health guidelines have relaxed, we work to remain relevant and accessible to both online and live audiences.

Three years into my tenure, I look to the future of Massey. I am excited to celebrate our 60th anniversary (in Fall 2023). Every day I am reminded of the resilience of this community, of its generosity and capacity for adaptation. I continue to be in awe of our staff, Junior Fellows, Senior Fellows and Quadrangle Society Members who make Massey what it is - more than a physical place, a strong and vibrant community, ready to help and share. 
To our donors, we offer our heartfelt appreciation for your support and commitment. The College relies every year on the generosity of our community to make the work of the College possible.

Nurturing Learning— the Massey College Junior Fellowship Program

This year's cohort of Junior Fellows found creative and effective means of sustaining community through a challenging time of isolation. Junior Fellows participated as organizers, speakers and moderators in all of the virtual Massey Dialogues. They established the Massey College Black Alumni Association and helped to lay the groundwork for the more formalized Junior Fellowship Program.

The Massey “Junior Fellows Professional Program” supports our Junior Fellows in building their capacity as future leaders. The learning objectives include:

- Public Engagement of Research
- Ethical and Inclusive leadership
- Interdisciplinary Exchange
- Building International Networks
- Self Awareness and Wellbeing

To further these aims, Massey College leveraged the intellectual capital of our senior members and Journalism Fellows to present programs and events exclusive to the Junior Fellows to develop these skills. Senior Fellow **Kim Kierans** hosted sessions on knowledge transfer, which led to The JCR – a 14 episode podcast produced by and featuring Junior Fellows. Alum **Chantal Phillips** led a three-session workshop on how to confront anti-Black racism. To build international competencies Junior Fellows were connected with diplomats, politicians and international leaders such as the former ambassador to the United States **David MacNaughton**, Deputy Prime Minister **Chrystia Freeland** and Minister of Justice and Attorney General of Canada **David Lametti**. Senior Fellow **David Robertson** and Psychiatrist-in-Chief, Health and Wellness at UofT, Andrea Levinson joined Junior Fellows

to outline mental health services for students and how to actively engage with mental supports for others. 2021 also saw the creation of three new roles at Massey to support these Junior Fellow initiatives:

Changemaker-in-Residence

Ekua Quansah and **Zahra Dhanani** were the 2021-2022 Changemaker-in-Residence. Ekua and Zahra assisted Junior Fellows in developing the skills necessary to lead and foster equitable, diverse and inclusive environments. They also helped students gain an understanding of conflict resolution practices and how to navigate conflict in ways that support the restoration of dignity and respect.

Peter Sloly is the 2022-2023 Social Changemaker-in-Residence.

Peter Sloly is a Canadian former police officer who served as the chief of police for the Ottawa Police Service from 2019 to 2022. Before joining the OPS, Sloly was a member of the Toronto Police Service for 27 years, including as a deputy chief of police from 2009 to 2016.

Prior to his police career, Sloly played soccer professionally, and made an appearance for the Canada Men's National Team in a 1984 friendly against Egypt.

Diplomat-in-Residence

Former Canadian Ambassador **Rosemary McCarney** was our 2021 Bill Graham Centre/Massey College Resident Visiting Scholar in Foreign and Defence Policy and is now our Diplomat-in-Residence. Rosemary assists Junior Fellows in understanding issues of climate change, diplomacy, national security and international relations.



Filmmaker-in-Residence

Peter Raymont is the President of White Pine Pictures, and has received multiple awards, including an Emmy (4 nominations), and a Sundance Award. Peter has been a film and television Director/Producer/Writer/Journalist for 50 years. Peter is a resource to Junior Fellows and offers advice on their use of media in many forms to express the ideas they are exploring in their research and organizes screenings/discussions for our community.



Junior Fellows are a diverse group, representing a variety of disciplines from biomedical engineering, law and anthropology to art history, language and literacies education, business administration and neuroscience to jazz studies. Of this year's Junior Fellows, 18% identify as a visible minority, 6% as a person with a disability, 9% identify as LGBTQ2+ and 20% are international students.

Gi-Chi-Twaa Gimaa Nini Mississauga Anishinaabek AName Amik *The Massey College Chapel Royal*

On National Indigenous Peoples' Day, June 21, 2017, Her Majesty **Queen Elizabeth II** bestowed a rare honour on St. Catherine's Chapel at Massey College. She designated it a Chapel Royal in recognition of the sesquicentennial of Canada and the relationship between Massey College and the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation.

In Anishinabemowin The Chapel Royal at Massey College is called Gi-Chi-Twaa Gimaa Nini Mississauga Anishinaabek AName Amik (The King's Anishinaabek Sacred Place), and it is to be a space searching for paths to truth and reconciliation.

In partnership with **Giima Stacey Laforme** and the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation, the College hosted the first annual ceremony to mark the National Day of Truth and Reconciliation.

This inaugural event was attended by Elder **Garry Sault**, Giima Stacey Laforme and the Premier of Ontario, the Hon. **Doug Ford** and the Hon. **Elizabeth Dowdeswell**. Two Indigenous Junior Fellows spoke – **James Bird** and **Rena Roussin**.

“**This is not an Indigenous issue; this is a we issue. This is your history whether you were born here or whether you arrived yesterday. This is my history and the darkness that came to these shores in the guise of friendship and the dark legacy that continues. Understanding is the first step.**”

The CBC Massey Lectures

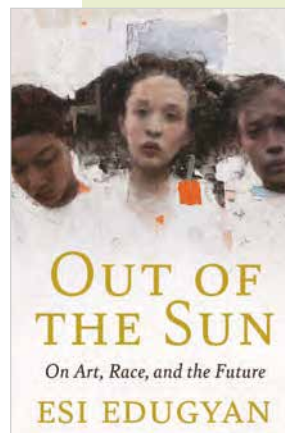
Massey College, in partnership with CBC and the House of Anansi Press, co-hosts the Massey Lectures, widely regarded as the most important public lectures in Canada. Established in 1961 to honour Vincent Massey, these annual lectures are given by a noted scholar or public figure, broadcast by the CBC from cities across Canada, and the text of the lecture is published by House of Anansi Press.

The 2021 CBC Massey Lectures were delivered by bestselling and acclaimed Canadian author **Esi Edugyan**, exploring the relationship between art and race.

In this groundbreaking, reflective, and erudite series of lectures, two-time Scotiabank Giller Prize winner and internationally bestselling author Esi Edugyan illuminates myriad varieties of Black experience in global culture and history. Edugyan combines storytelling with analyses of contemporary events and her own personal story.

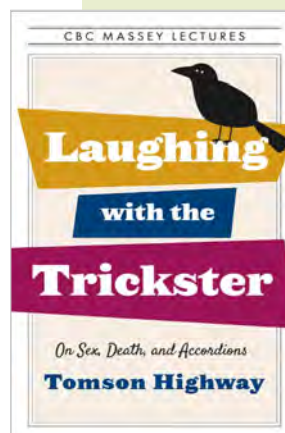

“What happens when we begin to consider stories at the margins, when we grant them centrality? How does that complicate our certainties about who we are, as individuals, as nations, as human beings? Through the lens of visual art, literature, film, and Edugyan’s lived experience, *Out of the Sun* examines Black histories in art, offering new perspectives to challenge us.”

The 2022 CBC Massey Lectures were delivered by acclaimed Cree playwright, author and musician **Tomson Highway**. The book of lectures *Laughing With the Trickster: On Sex, Death and Accordions* is also available from Anansi Press. Mr. Highway crossed the country and spoke to sold out venues in Fredericton, St. John’s, Saskatoon, Vancouver and Toronto.



The Massey Dialogues

In 2020, to keep the Massey community connected through the pandemic restrictions, the College launched a virtual series – **The Massey Dialogues**. This discussion series, available to the public through YouTube, is designed to embody the very essence of the college and community – highly-informed intergenerational and interdisciplinary discourse on current issues – featuring experts and scholars from the Massey community and beyond. Junior Fellows are invited to speak to subjects related to their research and studies, offering them an exceptional professional development opportunity to showcase their knowledge and expertise.

In the inaugural year, Massey College hosted 55 Massey Dialogues, and had more than 47,000 views from online participants from around the world and as far as Japan, Nigeria and Australia.

In 2020-21, five main areas of focus emerged: the impact of the pandemic, anti-Black racism, residential schools and their impact on Indigenous communities, climate change, and on-going challenges to our democracy and international relations.

The series has continued in a hybrid format with the easing of COVID restrictions. Community members can attend in person or online, and the Massey College YouTube channel has now over 1,000 subscribers, and almost 75,000 views.

The 2021-2022 season of the Massey Dialogues presented a range of ideas and topics. Here are a few examples:

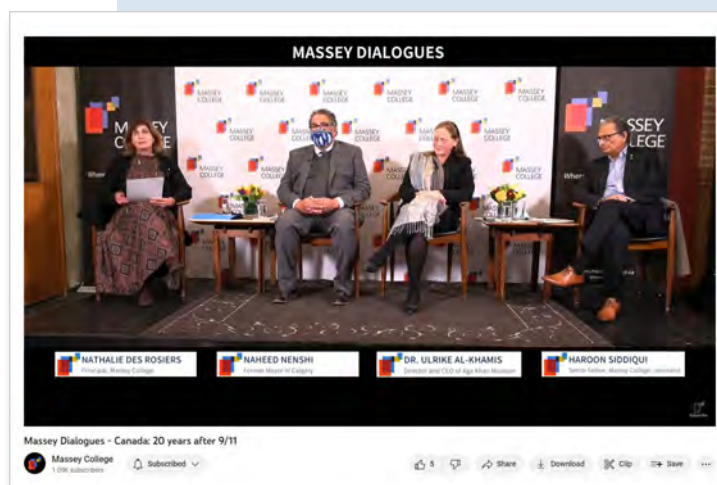
Classics and the Far Right: (mis)appropriation of classical antiquity & the future of the discipline

This dialogue between Professors **Jackie Murray** and **Katherine Blouin**, two international scholars of classical antiquity, and Journalism Fellow alum **Jonathan Montpetit** (a specialist in North American far-right politics), examined the ways in which far-right political groups draw from the literary and material culture of Ancient Greece and Rome to justify their political views. Their conversation shed new light on how this phenomenon affects Classics (as a discipline), and how it should react. The panel considered the role of journalism and academia in acknowledging and resisting this trend. The event was moderated by Junior Fellow **Vittorio Bottini**.

Cultural Workers Organize: Journalists & Digital Media Workers Against Precarity

Panelists Dr. **Nicole Cohen**, **Nasr Ahmed**, and Journalism Fellow Alum **Wency Leung** spoke with Junior Fellow **Christine H. Tran** on the challenges facing modern journalists at work. This Dialogue examined how journalists are organizing to improve working conditions in not only (digital) newsrooms, but in workplaces from all across the tumultuous media economy. They discussed:

- What motivates the rise of media union drives?
- What is the role of freelance journalists in alternative labour organizing?
- How does this rise of digital-first organizing depart from the media labour movements of yesteryear?



The Promise and Perils of Open Science for Pandemic Prevention

Dan Werb, the author of *The Invisible Siege: The Rise of Coronaviruses and the Search for a Cure*, was joined by Junior Fellow **Georgia Hadjis** and Senior Fellow **Akwasi Owusu-Bempah** to discuss the origins of COVID-19 and the discovery of the vaccines.

The Art of Science Telling: How Science Education Can Shape Society

The Art of Science -Telling: How Science Education Can Shape Society. Special guests **Farah Qaiser** (Evidence for Democracy), **Dr. Bonnie Schmidt** (Let's Talk Science) and Senior Fellow **Carolyn Tuohy** explored what non-profits can do for science education and policy. Moderated by Junior Fellow **Keshna Sood**.

Science and Aesthetics

Interdisciplinary connections between Science and non-Science disciplines are varied, but a particularly interesting case is how investigations of scientific phenomena relate to ideas from many disciplines about aesthetics. On one level, scientists often value aesthetics from a data presentation point of view, but it is also possible to understand how scientific research itself is founded on aesthetic principles while simultaneously generating new aesthetics itself. This panel brought together Junior Fellows **Hannah Morand** and **Nathaniel Starkman** in conversation with Dr. **Adam Hammond** from the University of Toronto Department of English and Dr. **Joel Ong** from York University's School of the Arts, Media, Performance and Design. Organized by Junior Fellows **Seshu Iyengar**, **Stephanie Redekop** and Senior Fellow **Barbara Sherwood Lollar**.

Programming at a Glance

The Massey community continues to address important issues of the day:

The annual global gathering of climate experts and governments was scheduled to be held in November of 2020. As the fifth such meeting since the critically important 2015 Paris Agreement, COP26 was to be pivotal in assessing progress and in strengthening commitments to slow global heating while it is still possible to preserve a stable climate. Due to the COVID-19 Pandemic, this important conference was postponed. As part of the College mandate to contribute to the public good, Diplomat-in-Residence, **Rosemary McCarney** and Senior Fellow **Dianne Saxe** curated over 15 events and workshops to build strategic momentum towards a powerful Canadian role at COP26 in 2021.

The Walter Gordon Symposium dealt with the role of artificial intelligence in our society.

We held conferences on the “Notwithstanding Clause”, on the role of cities in our constitution and the fragility of truth in our society.

Science @ Massey celebrated the legacy of Senior Fellow **Ursula Franklin** and the Massey Grand Rounds explored cutting-edge research in medicine, pain management, policy, and technology to advocate for and improve women’s health. Dr. **Lorraine Lipscombe** delivered the 4th annual Janet Rossant lecture on “The Impact of Diabetes on Women Across the Lifespan.”

The Book Club read about disability issues, racism and the power of narratives. We welcomed the Jack McClelland Writers-in-Residence **Souvankham Thammavongsa** and **David Chariandy**.

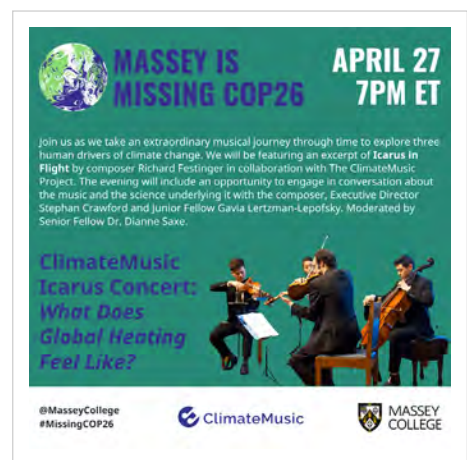

William Southam Journalism Fellowships

An integral part of the Massey College community, the William Southam Journalism Fellows are outstanding journalists in mid-career who are invited to spend an academic year at Massey College. The objective of the program is to encourage ethical excellence in journalism by offering journalists an opportunity to broaden their horizons in a university setting and create an environment of exchange of ideas and best practices.

Since 1962, the program has gathered more than 250 esteemed Canadian and international journalists for a year of education, reflection, and fellowship.

In tandem with the William Southam Fellows, the Gordon N. Fisher / Journalists for Human Rights Journalism Fellowship provides an opportunity for a journalist from one of the Journalists for Human Rights program countries in the Middle East and Sub-Saharan Africa.

The 2021-2022 William Southam Journalism Program had a successful year, bringing together a diverse and interdisciplinary group of journalists. Canadian journalists **Rebecca Collard** (freelance, based in Beirut), **Michael Barclay** (best-selling author and freelancer), Wency Leung (Globe and Mail) and **Jonathan Montpetit** (CBC) were joined by Nigerian international human rights freelance journalist **Patrick Egwu** as well as two journalists from Afghanistan: **Mujtaba Haris** (freelance) and **Jalal Nazari** (Wall Street Journal).

The gradual easing of COVID-19 restrictions allowed for a resumption of in-person events. We were also able to host a number of events at Massey and the Fellows planned and executed a number of events during the eight month Fellowship. Two Press Clubs were hosted – the fall term’s was entitled “Covering the Fringe: How Do We Report from Canada’s Social Edges” **Nam Kiwanuka** (TVO), **Craig Silverman** (Propublica) and **Sylvia Stead** (Public Editor, Globe and Mail) all participated. It was well attended by alumni of the program, Junior Fellows and donors. The second Press Club took place in March of the winter term and was titled “Watch Your Language: Navigating Linguistic Taboos in Today’s News Media.” This panel discussion brought together **Denise Balkissoon** (Ontario bureau chief of the Narwhal), **Heather Mallick** (columnist, Toronto Star) and **James McCarten** (Washington DC correspondent for the Canadian Press). Both events are available to view on the Massey College YouTube Channel. The Journalism Fellows organized two digital workshops specifically for the Junior Fellowship - one focussing on digital privacy with Senior Fellow and Director of the Citizen Lab **Ron Diebert** and the other, on digital verification with **Craig Silverman**.

Celebrating 60 Years of Journalism at Massey College

2022 brought the 60th anniversary of the William Southam Journalism Fellowship Program. To mark the occasion, on April 23rd, Massey College hosted a series of panels looking at the state of Canadian journalism and ended the program with a fundraising gala at the Toronto Reference Library. 2021 Nobel Peace Prize Laureate **Maria Ressa** was invited to deliver the keynote, but was prevented from leaving the Philippines in time to attend the event in person. This was devastating news, but she joined the event via zoom and gave brilliant remarks on her work reporting, scrutiny of government policies and coverage of the deadly war on drugs waged by President Duterte.

Massey College garnered national print coverage of the event and Ressa's inability to travel. A huge thank you to steering committee members Clair Balfour, Amara Bangura, Kim Kierans, Naheed Mustafa (Chair) and Jim Rankin. Maria Ressa was able to come to Canada in October of 2022 and was interviewed on-stage by CBC/Radio Canada Fellow **Omayra Issa**.

The William Southam Journalism Fellowships are made possible through the generosity of the estate of the late St. Clair Balfour, Lisa Balfour Bowen and the late Walter Bowen, Clair Balfour and Marci McDonald, Wilson J.H. Clarkson Laureateships

Clarkson Laureateships for Public Service

The Clarkson Laureateships are named in honour of The Rt. Hon. **Adrienne Clarkson**, Governor General of Canada (1999-2005) and a Senior Fellow of the College, for her many years of service to Canada. Since 2004, the award has recognized members of the Massey community who similarly contribute to the common good.

On January 21, 2022, Laureateships were awarded to **James Bird**, a fifth year Junior Fellow, **Leah Morris** a Junior Fellow alum **Alexander Sarra-Davis** a fifth year Junior Fellow at High Table in the presence of special guests and their Massey College peers.



James Bird is a residential school survivor and now strives at top-tier academic levels to not only address these wrongs but to acquire the skills as an architect to design and build sustainable, well-built homes and community centres for

First Nation reserves and communities. He is a member of the University of Toronto's Truth and Reconciliation Commission Steering Committee. In 2017, he partnered with history professors, Heidi Bohaker and Laurie Bertram, to create *Canada by Treaty: Negotiating Histories* a travelling exhibition that explains Canada's history of treaty making with Indigenous Peoples. James also works as a traditional knowledge keeper of the Nēhiyawak and Dēnesųliné Nations with the Office of the Lieutenant Governor of Ontario. His work as a Junior Fellow at Massey College is well known. He has participated in several Massey Dialogues on Indigenous issues and has supported the celebration of Ron Thom's architecture. James supports Indigenous students including Junior Fellows and in his chosen field of architecture.



Leah Morris is a tireless advocate for and leader in social justice and equity within the Massey community and beyond. Leah contributed to the common good at Massey through her pioneering work to create the first LGBTQ+

Pride week in 2019. She was elected and served as a non-resident member of House Committee, as Equity

and Inclusivity Representative to the Community Liaison as well as Co-Chair of Massey's Gender and Sexual Diversity Committee. Leah has a long history of volunteerism - after finishing her undergraduate degree, she worked in Kingston, Jamaica with Caribbean Vulnerable Communities to secure critical donations from the Global Fund to combat malaria, tuberculosis and AIDS. In 2018, she was the lead evaluator of the GALA Archives as well as worked as an intern at the International Organization for Migration in Geneva, Switzerland on issues related to migration, environment and climate change.



Alexander Sarra-Davis – In his time as a Junior Fellow, Alexander served as a mentor to fellows in both a formal and informal capacity. Over the course of his time at Massey, he served the college in numerous ways as: House Committee member, convener,

student governance (2017-2022), Equity and Inclusivity Secretariat convener (2021-2022), Community Service Committee co-chair (2021-2022), Quarter Century Fund co-chair, alumni funding (2018-2020), Community Liaison Committee member (2018-2020), and the Lionel Massey Fund member (2016-2018). Alexander also sat on a small taskforce that rewrote the JCR constitution into plain language to make it a more easily accessible document. In addition to his myriad of governance work for the Junior Fellowship, Alexander also played an integral part in the planning, printing and production of *Audeamus* – the literary and visual arts journal of Massey College.

Scholars-at-Risk Fellowship

Around the globe, outstanding scientists, humanists, social scientists and other scholars are the victims of repression and violence. Many are driven abroad or find themselves unable to return to their home countries. Since 1999, Massey College and University of Toronto School of Graduate Studies have provided support to scholars at risk. The program serves two purposes: it provides humanitarian assistance for a small number of distinguished academics and outstanding students, and enables such scholars to contribute to the intellectual life of the College and University. This past year, Nevin Alqishawi, Negar Banisafar, Vadym Lytvynov, Natalia Machalina and Diego Rojas received support through the Scholars-at-Risk program.

Massey College also hosted two Visiting Scholars from the Ukraine, Sergiy Ivakhenkov and Dmitry Yefremov and Ghizal Haress, a constitutional expert and scholar who served as Afghanistan's first presidential Ombudsperson.

Alumni Impact

Our Junior Fellows share the lifetime commitment to the values at the heart of the College – to nurture learning and serve the public good.

Massey alumni are taking on challenging leadership roles and tackling the complex issues that we face, in every sector and around the globe. They have become leading academics, business leaders, founders of start-ups and charitable organizations, astronauts, lawyers, discovered scientific breakthroughs and world-renowned artists.



Paul Chen and Elizabeth Phillips were named two of the 2022 Schmidt Science Fellows. The prestigious Schmidt Science Fellows program is an international competition designed to select the world's best

emerging scientists to equip them so they develop novel solutions to society's challenges, and accelerate ground-breaking discoveries. Paul and Elizabeth were two of 29 fellows selected, and the only Canadian recipients. Anastasia Korolj received the fellowship in 2021 as the only Canadian recipient that year.



Olugbenga Olubango Olufemi, founder and CEO of Reeddi, built a technology to provide clean, reliable and affordable electricity to individuals, households and businesses operating in energy-poor regions of the world. In 2022,

Olu's Reeddi Capsule was nominated as one of 15 finalists for Prince William's the (need pound symbol) 1M Earthshot Prize. The capsule was also named TIME Magazine's Best Invention of 2021 and Olu was named as one of 5 young African entrepreneurs on the 2022 Bloomberg New Economy Catalyst list



Anupama Sharan, was the recipient of one of two inaugural Chisholm Awards for Innovation in Forestry. This award recognizes research that has the potential to strengthen the forestry sector and help Canada meet

its net-zero climate change goals. Anupama's current research is focused on adding value to lignin-active enzymes – one of the most underutilized, renewable by-products from the forestry sector in Canada – in order to sustainably replace fossil-fuel derived sources for making widely used polymeric products such as resins and adhesives, in a carbon-neutral manner.



Phil De Luna was named one of 50 'Changemakers' by the *Globe and Mail* and received an Early Career Award from the Engineering Alumni Network for his work in 2022. Phil is now a sustainability expert at McKinsey & Company advising

corporate, government and non-profit organizations on decarbonization and sustainable growth.
